Church News

Mrs. Vanstone's letter regarding dog faeces in the Churchyard was discussed at the PCC meeting in July. We all feel for Mrs. Vanstone but other than fencing the Graveyard or having a 24 hour patrol there is little we can do. We intend to erect signs asking dog owners to clean up after their dogs, and we are happy to say that most of the dog owners we see are always carrying little bags. It is just a shame that dogs cannot read.

At this meeting the following was agreed.

- 1) A number of complaints have been received lately from house owners being unable to take their cars out of their forecourts due to people attending Funerals leaving cars across entrances. Most Funeral directors erect signs at the Hall Car park entrance, and we intend to ask the rest to do the same.
- 2) Some months ago Ethel Huxtable asked where the good Silver was and why we did not use it. This came as a big surprise to the rest of the PCC. as we knew nothing about other Communion Ware other than the pieces we use. After contacting various Church Wardens Geoff Folland asked his Father John(now 102) if he knew anything. His reply was that the rev. Wallington had deposited it in the bank in '79. Thankfully he remembered as we have found no record of the four pieces. These have now been valued & having obtained a faculty we will store them at the Cathedral vaults.
- 3) After an inspection we have started to repair the flooring on the north side of the Church. Hopefully this area will not be needed as we had to remove some of the pews.
- 4) A wobble test has been carried out in the Churchyard to test the safety of the Gravestones. Only two were found be dangerous and the owners have been asked to ensure their stones are safe.

The judges were impressed by the standard especially considering the rain and wind in the preceding week which undoubtedly spoiled some flowers. There were a few minor glitzes which hopefully we will improve upon for next year's show. The recipe for Brownies (taken from Master Chef Bible) was not good – several mentioned this! The Eats judge is going to forward some recipes which she knows works for next year's show.



There were some superb photographs again this year and next year each class will be more specific e.g. Flowers in one class and Trees in another. The standard of drinks especially sloe gin and wines impressed the judge and although the number of children's entries were down this year they were of a high quality.

There were a couple of errors on the schedule – a missing number, conflicting information on how to present onions and discrepancy on the number of biscuits etc to exhibit. And not enough tables and chairs for tea and cakes!! We will look at addressing these problems for next year and getting the schedule out in the New Year. Thank you to the WI for making and donating savouries and cakes and again special thanks to those who did not take their prize money. By the time judges expenses for lunch and travel were taken into consideration we made a small profit and donate £60 to the WI for their funds.

Unfortunately the 40's Night with AJ's Big Band was cancelled because of insufficient interest. This was due in part to the Farm Fest at Shebbear with 6 live bands but also a number of folk interested were away on the date set. AJ's was booked over a year ago and as the cost of the band is £1800 we did not want them to play to a small audience and make a huge loss at the same time. We have forfeited the deposit of £200 paid.

An Abba Tribute band has been booked for 14th November at a cost of £1100. I have been told that it is a very professional group with plenty of costume changes and own lighting set up. Can I ask if you would like to come to this event to book by 30th October so I know we have an audience! The cost is £12.50 there will be a bar, nibbles on the tables and a chance to sing along to your favourites . 8pm start.

Speeding in Stibb Cross and Langtree

They would be required to undergo a CRB check and would also be attested as Police volunteer assistants, with absolutely no commitment other than as Speed Watch volunteers



From our Local Councillor

It's now been over three months since the District Elections took place and the dust has settled. Torridge District Council has 36 elected Councillors and when all the results came in, 16 were newly elected. I must say that everyone has settled in well and all Committees are now fully operational.

A couple of months ago there was a big shock when we saw the demise of South Molton Recycle - a Company that had for many years dealt with the recycling demands of Torridge residents. Despite the fact that TDC had very little warning that SMR had gone into Administration, both Officers and Councillors swung into action. The public were asked via posters, announcements on local radio and a message on the TDC website to either hold onto their recycling or take it to their local recycling centres. Temporary collecting skips were placed at several locations in the Torridge area to help residents dispose of their recycling.

Two weeks after the Administration announcement the recycling service, complete with replacement vehicles and some new staff, was up and running again. As larger vehicles were being used it was possible to reduce the number of collecting rounds from 9 to 5 and still give the same service, and cover the same areas, as before. On the first day of operation the crews worked a longer than usual day and collected over 20 tonnes of recycling. The average collection is 15 tonnes. The service, several weeks later, is running smoothly with just the occasional problem to be ironed out. TDC thanked the public for their co-operation during the massive task of starting a collection service from virtually nothing. This was a superb effort from the recycling team.

During my election campaign I spoke with many people and a topic that arose on several occasions was vehicles speeding through both Stibb Cross and Langtree. As such, at a Parish Council meeting a couple of months ago, I asked that the Speedwatch programme be instigated. For this programme to go ahead at least 6 volunteers are required before PCSO Baker is able to offer training. An advert requesting volunteers to form a Speedwatch Team was placed in the last edition of Langtree News and, to date, only one person has come forward. I'm sure that many people in our villages are unhappy with speeding drivers so I can't understand why there has been such a poor response to the advert. In short, no volunteers so no Speedwatch. This is disappointing as residents have indicated to me that they would like a safer environment as they walk and drive through our villages. If anybody is interested in helping to form a Speedwatch team please contact the Parish Clerk – Mike Evans.

Torridge District Council is moving to a single customer reception centre at Riverbank House, Bideford. This will take place by April 2016. This will help them to provide a single reception point for all services, answer enquiries at the first point of contact, improve their customer contact, reduce the number of council offices and reduce their costs. The cost reduction is obviously vital in these times of austerity. We all know that Central Government is trying to save costs in any way that it can. As a result the money given to DCC, and ultimately Torridge, is to reduce over the next couple of years. Torridge District Council are carrying out a public consultation exercise lasting 8 weeks to try and get their customers to tell them what issues they foresee from the move to a single reception point. The consultation will last from 27th July to 21st September. Forms can be completed at Bridge Buildings, Town Hall Bideford or at River Bank House Bideford. Alternatively the consultation form can be completed online at the TDC website. It is important that anybody that has any thoughts with regard to this important change should let their opinions be known to TDC. It's no good complaining later if your needs have not been addressed. If you don't complete the consultation form nobody will be aware of what your needs are.

I'm glad to see that the hole in the road at Fore Street that I reported to Highways was eventually patched. It didn't take too long in the grand scheme of things. There are many outlying roads that have far worse potholes and have been in a poor state of repair for much longer than Fore Street was. I frequently contact DCC Highways with regard to the state of the roads. If you are aware of damage that is in need of repair then please report it to Highways via the DCC website. Again, if the problems are not reported nothing will be done because nobody is aware of the issues.

Finally, I'd like to mention land at the Crescent in Langtree.. I understand that residents would like to use this land for either allotments or a Community Garden. A residents' representative approached the Parish Council who, as I understand it, have written to TDC requesting advice with regard to a Community Garden and the possibility of this land being used for such a scheme. TDC prefer to correspond with Parish Councils acting on behalf of resident groups such as this one for continuity, as it is felt that over a period of time residents come and go, but the Parish Council will always be there. Either way, allotments or Community Garden, I will be following this issue with interest. Meanwhile, on with the summer........ Kind regards, David Hurley

Bible Christian Bicentenary Celebrations

This year marks the bicentenary of he Bible Christian Church which was founded by William O'Bryan, a Wesleyan Methodist local preacher, in October 1815 in North Cornwall. The first society, just 22 members, met at Lake Farm in Shebbear on October 9th 1815. There had been a mini-revival following the preaching of Daniel Evans, the curate at St Michaels, Shebbear. William O'Bryan enlisted the help of the Thorne family at Lake Farmhouse to form a society. O'Bryan's missions took him all over Devon and eventually to Langtree where on the Green(?) he was met with hostility including the throwing of stones! The Thornes thought Langtree people rather ferocious but eventually his message hit home and Thorne House began meetings until the first chapel was built. The congregation outgrew that building and so the new chapel was built up the road. The denomination was strong in the Westcountry but spread out to Canada, Australasia and China before merging with other Methodist groups in the early 20th century.

From 2 – 9th October 2015 there will be an exhibition of photos and display of the history of the Bible Christian movement at Lake Chapel, Shebbear. On Friday 9th October there will be tea from 5pm – 6.30pm followed by a Celebration at 7pm with music and drama. Please look out for posters nearer the time for more information.
