Super Fast Broadband has arrived in Langtree this week.

Well for those of us who are within 1.2km of the phone cabinet at the Parish Hall can now get super-fast broadband to a speed of 76 megabytes per second.

For those of us who can't get a fast connection 'Connecting Devon and Somerset' has committed to bringing broadband to everyone within the programme area. If you are not yet able to receive broadband speeds of over 2Mbps you may be able to get connected through the CDS voucher scheme. The scheme will provide a subsidy of up to £500, in the form of a voucher code, to fund the installation of a new broadband connection. Each premise can choose their supplier from the list below; with every solution guaranteeing a minimum of 10Mbps download speed.

The scheme will run for one year up until the March 2017 and is open to individual residents, small businesses and communities. Individuals, small business and communities must approach the suppliers on the Voucher Scheme for further details of their services and decide on the best fit with their requirements. Communities should work with suppliers to decide on a solution, however the individual voucher holder is able select their own supplier and a group cannot make a decision on behalf of another. Any premises connected through the scheme are still eligible for later extensions of the broader programme.

Kundalini Yoga at Langtree

Kundalini yoga is for everyone

If you can breathe and move, you can do Kundalini Yoga. It balances the glandular system and strengthens the nervous system so you feel more vibrant and alive. Although some postures require a degree of mobility, adaptations will be offered to suit individual needs.

Kundalini Yoga is practical but also very powerful. It works quickly to give you grace, balance and most of all, the ability to remain calm, centered, and clear through life's challenges. As you practice Kundalini Yoga you will gain new perspectives and capacities, as well as habits that support a healthy lifestyle. You don't need any previous experience in yoga to achieve results with your very first class. Kundalini Yoga is spiritual but not religious and people of all faiths or no particular faith will benefit from practicing it.

What to expect in a Kundalini Yoga Class

Tuning In: When we practice Kundalini Yoga, we tune in by chanting 'Ong Namo Guru Dev Namo', connecting us to the purity of the infinite teacher living within each of us.

Breath: Breath is life energy itself. When we learn how to breathe consciously, we can calm our minds and master all aspects of our lives.

Kriya: A Kriya is an exact, dynamic combination of postures, breathing and sound – a complete system that balances body, mind and soul, and increases mental clarity and physical vitality.

Meditation: Meditation brings awareness and control of our thoughts. Using mantra (sacred sound currents repeated aloud or silently) and mudra (sacred gestures) we can clear negative patterns and connect with our higher consciousness.

Preparing for a class

Ideally avoid food for 2-3 hours before a class. Wear loose fitting comfortable clothing. Bring a bottle of water and drink plenty. If possible, bring a yoga mat, blanket and cushion (I do bring spares but it's good to have your own.

The names of the exercises may make Yoga seem strange and very different, but if you have done "warm ups", stretches and "cool downs" in other group exercises, or have had physiotherapy you will recognize most of what we do in a class. - NP




Little Acorns Toddler Group

Dear Friends,

Why, oh why is it called Good Friday? A couple of days before Easter, and we mark the death of an amazing man – and a pretty horrendous death too. And we call it 'good'. About the only good thing is the hot cross buns – and you can get them all year round now! So why 'Good Friday'? What's good about it?

Well, for Christians, two things in particular. Firstly it is here that we find God really getting into bed with us. This isn't God just playing at getting involved with human life. This is God doing the full monty. It's all in. He takes on death as well. As we see Jesus hanging upon the cross, we see in him God entering into the utmost depths of human experience. There is no 'thus far, and no further'. With God there is nothing that is off-limits. And that must be good news for us. Whatever we go through then, God is there too. He is not there just for the nice bits, but for the really grotty bits as well. With God there is nothing beyond his experience.

But if that was all, it wouldn't be much. Ok so God comes to the depths, but what about coming out of the depths. God's not much use if he's stuck in the depths. So Good Friday can make no sense without Easter Day. But then Easter Day makes little sense without Good Friday – it's just chocolate bunnies and Easter eggs. With no Easter Day, Good Friday isn't good. But with it, it tells of a God who does indeed plumb the depths with us, but also can bring us through. With him there is new life, new hope – a new world. And not just beyond physical death, but this side of death as well. But to get there we have to die. Die to ourselves, die to this world, die to our hopes and dreams, die before God.

Will you? Will you enter into Good Friday? Will you let it be 'good'? It's the only way through to Easter Day.

Rules for Entries

Classes are open to residents of Langtree Parish and those outside the Parish who are members of Clubs or Societies that meet regularly in the Parish Hall. This includes Langtree Primary School, WI, History Group, Short Mat Bowls. Maximum 2 entries per class.

Entry fee is 15p per exhibit. Under 16's free in own classes but they may enter other classes on payment of the fee.

All entry forms with correct fee to be returned to Old Rectory Langtree or box at the Parish Hall by 12 noon on Thursday 11th August

Exhibits to be staged by 10.30am on 13th August. Doors open at 8.30am but will be locked at 10.30am. No exhibitors or any other person except judges, stewards and committee members to be present during judging.

Exhibitors must provide own vases, plates etc All exhibits of Fruit, Flowers or Vegetables must be grown by the exhibitor. (Except flower arrangements) Prizes in each class 1st £1.50p 2nd £1.00p, 3rd 50p. However judges may withhold prizes if there are insufficient entries in any one class or where they think they are not merited. To award 3rd prize there must be a minimum of 5 entries in that class.

• The decision of the judges is final.

Recipe for Tea Wine Class 99 Ingredients

4 tablespoons of loose tea (any, some scented teas make lovely wine)

2.5 lb Sugar

2 tsp citric acid

1 gallon of water

Yeast and nutrient

Method

Pour the boiling water over tea and sugar, stir well and infuse until cool.

Strain into fermenting jar; add citric acid, nutrient, yeast and top up with cold water.

Fit a cork and air lock, ferment out and rack.

Bottle as usual when stable.

A clear dry wine excellent for blending should result!

Recipe for Elderflower Champagne Class 100 Ingredients

4 heads of Elderflower

1.5 lb sugar

2 tablespoons of white wine vinegar

1 gallon of water

2 lemons

Method

Put elderflowers, sugar, vinegar and water in a bucket. Squeeze lemons and add juice to the bucket. Cut lemon skins in quarters and add to the liquid. Leave to stand for 24hours stirring occasionally Strain and bottle into screw top bottles Ready to drink in a few days

Filled Lemon Macarons Class 83

The French version of our macaroons, which combines crispness and chewy tenderness

Makes 15 shells.

Oven temp 150deg C 300deg F Gas 2 Ingredients

3 lrg egg whites – at room temperature 25g/1oz granulated sugar 200g/7oz icing sugar 125g/4oz ground almonds 2 tbsp water

Yellow food colouring

<u>Filling</u>

Butter cream flavoured with finely grated lemon rind

Method

Whip the egg whites until stiff, and then beat in the granulated sugar until you achieve glossy foam. Sieve almonds and icing sugar twice, and then fold into the meringue with the food colouring.

Fold the mixture over and over until the batter flows from the spatula in a thick ribbon. Test by dropping a small amount on a plate – it should form a smooth dome, not a peak. If it looks peaky, fold the mix again. Put oven on to preheat.

Draw small circles on baking parchment – well spaced apart. (About an inch and a half as a guide)

Lay the paper upside down on a heavy baking sheet. Pour the mix onto the centre of the circles using a piping bag or by hand, tap the edge of the baking sheet sharply to help the mixture settle, adjusting if necessary. Leave to rest in a dry atmosphere for 15 mins. A light, unsticky top should form ready for baking.

Bake for 8-10 mins until they are firm and glossy. Cool, then gently peel off the baking paper. Make two batches (30 shells) Fill with lemon cream and sandwich together.

Irish Soda Bread Rolls Class 85

Ingredients and Method

Oven 200 deg C /180 deg (fan)/Gas 6

In a bowl mix 250g wholemeal flour and 250g plain flour with 2 teaspoons salt and 3 teaspoons Bicarbonate of Soda.

Gently incorporate 500mls Buttermilk and knead the dough for a few minutes.

Dust the worktop with flour and divide the dough into 12 equal pieces. Gently shape into balls.

Place on a lined baking tray then snip a cross on the top of each.

Brush with a little milk then sprinkle with porridge oats. Bake the rolls for 12-15 mins until golden. Cool on a cooling rack.

Check that they are cooked by knocking on the bottom. You should hear a hollow sound

Onion & Herb Focaccia Class 88

Makes 2 Italian style flatbreads

Ingredients

225g/8ozs strong plain flour

1 tsp fast action yeast

1 tsp salt (sea salt if available)

1 level dessertspoon dried mixed herbs or equivalent in fresh. Suggestions: sage, bay leaves, rosemary, thyme, oregano

1 red onion – chopped and cooked to soften

2 tbsp virgin olive oil

4-5 fluid oz of warm water

Method

Sift flour into large bowl, stir in yeast and salt. Add chopped herbs and onions and using a wooden spoon or dough hooks, beat in olive oil and enough warm water to make a soft dough. Remove from bowl onto a board and knead for 8-10 mins.

Brush a clean bowl with oil, put dough in and cover with a damp cloth or clingfilm. Leave in a warm place for at least an hour until doubled in size. Preheat the oven to 220deg C, 425deg F or Gas 7.

Knock back the dough and divide in half. Roll out into oval shapes about a half inch thick.

Place on oiled baking sheets, cover with oiled Clingfilm and leave to rise for twenty minutes.

Brush the tops with oil, then bake for 15-20 minutes. (Herbs can be poked into the top if liked) Wrap in a clean tea towel to cool. Wrap well and eat within 2 days.

VIEW EXAMPLES OF WORK

From our Local Councillor David Hurley 01805 601604

The Christmas and New Year festivities are now a distant memory. It's a pity that the same can't be said for the persistent and heavy rain. So much rain has fallen these past few months that there is now nowhere for it to soak away and during a recent walk on the Tarka Trail the value of decent and unobstructed ditches and gulleys that feed the streams and rivers was apparent. Due to reduced Financial support from Westminster, Devon County Council have had to reduce funding for the Lengthsmen who, until now, have been responsible for clearing ditches of obstructions and hence help prevent flooding. They will now perform this job on an annual basis so we will be more reliant than ever on local labour to provide an alternative service to ensure vulnerable areas are kept clear.



Our Environment may be changing and this, according to some reports, is down to Climate Change. I was therefore pleased to recently accept an invitation, together with other TDC and N. Devon Councillors, to accompany members of the North Devon Biosphere to be shown some of the work that they do. The Biosphere's aim is to "Develop partnerships and manage projects for a sustainable future in North Devon. The N. Devon Biosphere team help, advise and facilitate partnerships and projects." We stood on the Rothern Bridge in Torrington and were told how volunteers sample bottom living invertebrates at that section of the Torridge once per month from May to September. Invertebrate species have different tolerances to pollution so the levels of pollution can be determined by the invertebrate species found. We later visited a farm just outside Barnstaple where the Biosphere have been assisting the farmer to obtain grants, and advise him how to collect the water runoff from his field, and by using a system of pits, allow the water to fill the pit before exiting via an overflow pipe and leaving the heavier nutrients and soils behind. These nutrients are later collected and re-spread over the land. Despite Storm Imogen being in evidence on the day I spent with the team, I found the tour both educational and enjoyable.

I am pleased to see that work has commenced at the site of the new housing development known as Langtree Meadows next to the Village Hall. It has taken a long time to get to this stage so hopefully it will now be full steam ahead and the houses will be built, particularly the much needed affordable homes.

There is no further news as yet with regard to the allotments/communal garden at The Crescent. The area has been looked at by TDC and is to be included in the Local Plan due for submission later this year. Andrew Waite, Property Manager at TDC, is going to attend a Parish Council meeting, hopefully in the near future, to inform Councillors of the plan for The Crescent.

Busy times indeed at TDC. Members have just attended a meeting at Caddesdown to decide the course that the Council will take for the next four years. The Devolution Document has now been submitted. This is just the start of a discussion that, if successful, would see local Democracy have a greater say in how our areas are run and hopefully less interference from London. The Boundary Commission are presently looking at all the present Wards in Torridge with a view to possibly altering them. The last time the Ward boundaries were set, many years ago, the ratio of residents to Councillor was felt to be correct. Since then there have been many changes in that ratio and some Wards have fewer residents and other Wards have more residents than the Boundary Commission recommend. The aim is to have each vote carry the same weight. Results of the review will be known in early 2017. Comments on any changes can be made at consultation.lgcbe.org.uk

I note that at a recent Parish Council meeting that a local resident had complained about Greeny Lane. I have reported on the DCC website several pot-holes on this road and even though Greeny Lane is not in my Ward I have made representations to the Highways Officer responsible for road repairs. I am however, at this stage, not too hopeful that the situation will change as to the state of that road as it is classed as a "C" road and as such is well

down the list of priorities for Highways.

Finally, may I thank the Parish Hall Players, all those that were involved backstage and "front of house" in this year's Panto, "Captain Hook's Revenge", for all their hard work in bringing an amusing and vastly enjoyable presentation to Langtree Village Hall for the public's entertainment. If you weren't able to attend you missed a treat.

Live Link-Up with Major Tim Peake at the International Space Station Class Three took part in a live link-up with the International Space Station recently, when they were able to submit questions to Major Tim Peake to answer from the Station as it orbited our planet. He entertainingly demonstrated how life without the effects of gravity, and being weightless, can sometimes be quite tricky using on-board live experiments in the Cosmic Classroom. He provided answers, to questions such as "Which is an astronaut's favourite button?"
