We have had quite a productive time at Butts Meadow since last we wrote.

People have been very kind. We would like to say a few thank you's, the one closest to home is Pat Mitchell, not only has his allotment looked lovely all summer, but he has been a great help to us on the Community Garden.

Pat has done some spraying for us, has helped us move the slabs that were donated by Sandra Jennings at Bridgmans across the rather large field away from the view of house owners in the Crescent. He has also delivered Sand for us to lay said slabs. The most important and helpful thing he has done, with kind financial assistance from the Council, is to dig out and lay pipe and tap up to the road so that the water board, who are not quite as speedy can connect water supply.

We have been so lucky, we also need to thank Steve Watts at Travis Perkins for helping with the Community Shed, Emma Marsh from RHS Rosemore with all the tools that they have donated and all the contributions from our fellow villages for all there generosity, Also for The Donation of £500 pounds from the Balsdon Trust, who support local community projects, that has paid for our Shed and will cover a few other expenses also. Thank You.

Our next work day will be on Saturday 21st October, the task at hand is to remove black plastic from area reserved for our soft fruits, dig over soil and remove all weeds and plant all soft fruits ready for next summer. If you could help in any way, elbow grease or plants please come along, you could be lucky and have tea and cake!

So what's on at Langtree Parish Hall?

Our biggest item to report is the refurbishment of the male and female toilets. The original toilet cubicles were installed in 2002 when the Hall was built and were a low cost choice to keep within budget. The work is pencilled in starting the week beginning 9th October and should take approximately 3 weeks. The 2 disabled toilets will be available for use whilst the work is being done and this means the Hall can still be in use for regular bookings.

The shower in the ladies will be replaced by 2 additional toilet cubicles giving a total of 5. Hopefully this will reduce queuing on busy functions! Hand-air dryers will be installed in both toilets but the paper towel dispensers will be retained. There will be an integral worktop and basin unit in the ladies. The present taps will be replaced with those which turn off automatically. This should reduce the water bills at the Hall which are a major item of expenditure.

The cubicles in both toilets will be the same colour (soft green and grey!) and the pipe work to the water cisterns and urinals will be hidden by panelling. We had 3 estimates for the work which ranged from £30000 to £54000 all with a similar specifications. Needless to say we have accepted the £30000 estimate with some amendments. Financing of this project will be done from Langtree Parish Hall reserves.

The next big news story to report on is that the land behind the Hall has now been transferred to Langtree Parish Council as part of an agreement with Torridge District Council and the developer of the new houses. Part of the agreement was that a changing room block was built to shell construction. This has been done but now needs to be fitted out. Grants of £23700 have been secured and additional funding has been applied for.

The wash basins and urinals from the Hall toilets will be used in this building. Now that this is underway decisions need to be made on the use of this land. It is approximately 6 acres of which 1 acre is earmarked for recreational/ playing field use but the rest is negotiable. There have been suggestions that a dog walking area around the perimeter be included and a multi-use games area with hard surfaces. All this takes money so grants will be sought when it is known what the community wants from this land. With this in mind an open meeting to all has been arranged for 25th November from 2pm.

This will be an opportunity to walk the land (weather permitting), look at the layout of the land and have your say. Grants can only be applied for when there is sufficient interest and show community involvement so come along! Light refreshments will be available.

Past events in August and early September were busy. There were 3 weddings, 2 christenings and 2 business meetings for Wild Life Trust. The 10th Parish Show held on 12th August was a great community effort with excellent entries again in the photographic section and the Children's section. Entries were down in the vegetable classes party due to the weather but other factors played a part. The standard of work in the craft section was also very high.

The food judge made some interesting comments and has pointers on how to display and present items for judging. An information sheet will be available for the next show which has been set for Saturday August 11th. At the time of writing 171 have been booked in for the Autumn Lunch held on September 10th.

No such thing as a typical drunk driver.

Devon and Cornwall Police's annual summer drink drive campaign, run along with other UK police forces in June 2017, has highlighted that there is no such thing as a typical drunk driver and exploded some other myths along the way.

You are twice as likely to get caught for drink impaired driving in Devon and Cornwall - TRUE. Since 2013, the average percentage of drivers who have been stopped in Devon and Cornwall that were positive, failed or refused a breath test is 20%. The national average from figures released by the NPCC this year is 10%.

I won't be prosecuted if my breath test is under the legal limit - FALSE.

If the police have observed you driving in a careless or dangerous fashion whether you have had a collision or not, or if you have a collision, you could still be arrested, charged and prosecuted for a "Section 4" offense of driving a mechanically propelled vehicle whilst unfit through drink or drugs even if you are "under the limit" of 35 micrograms of alcohol per 100 millilitres of breath.

I'll be alright to drive in the morning - FALSE.

No, you very likely won't be. There is no way to be certain that you have "slept off" that drinking session. From a sample of 98 of the 135 people that had a positive, failed or refused breath test this June, seven were found to be significantly over the limit the morning after. One 38-year-old man blew 147 (micrograms of alcohol per 100 millilitres of breath) at 9.24 on a Wednesday morning. Sleep has nothing to do with reducing the alcohol level in your blood, only time.

I won't be breaking the law if the car isn't moving - FALSE.

If you are in a car and have been drinking and you have the means to start that vehicle, then the burden of proof is upon you to prove that you did not intend to drive it. This June people certainly tried and were still tested and arrested. One driver was asleep in the car with the engine running and one even claimed that they were living in their car.

It's just a fine and some points on the license, maybe a ban for a few months - FALSE.

People convicted of drink or drug driving can expect to be banned from driving for at least 12 months, receive a fine of up to £5,000 and/or six months in prison. When someone dies as a result of a collision involving a driver under the influence of drugs or alcohol, sentences can carry a penalty of up to ten years in prison. In June at least two 24 month disqualifications were handed down, and one driver went to prison for six weeks.

The police just stop people at random - FALSE.

If that were the case, the arrest rate in Devon and Cornwall wouldn't be as high. Roads policing is intelligence led and you can help. If you have information that someone has been drinking and is going to drive then in an emergency call **999**. Alternatively contact Crimestoppers anonymously on **0800 555111**. Not that some drink drivers need help to be spotted by police and stopped. Leaving aside those seen to be driving erratically or with excess speed, from our sample we had drivers who: drove into a pedestrian area; drove into parked cars, drove into a lamppost and drove into a no entry road, who left the scene of an accident and one who was found slumped at the wheel and then fell out of the car when the door was opened and was later found also to have cocaine in their blood.

Drink driver...absolutely typical!

There's no such thing as a typical drink driver. The list of arrested drivers jobs from our sample of 98 reads just short of an A to Z of professions: from Administrative Assistant to Welfare Worker, passing through everything from Civil Engineer, Dispatch Rider, Fisherman, Plasterer, Plumber, Scientist, Student and Welder on the way. 20% of people stopped were unemployed and between 30% and 40% were aged under 25.

Surely every British person has got the message about drink driving by now? - FALSE.

Sadly not. 79% of the drivers arrested in our sample were British, with the other 21% being made up of 10 different nationalities.

So nothing's changed then - FALSE.

Attitudes to drink driving are changing, although there is still room for improvement. While there are very few people who would think it acceptable to jump into their car after a drinking session at the pub, for which there is no excuse, the rest of us still have to think more about the consequences of driving the morning after: don't risk it. Drink driving is increasingly socially unacceptable and is even less so when the impact of losing your license, your job and the respect of your friends and family if you are arrested is taken into account. While the number of stops have gone down since figures were recorded in 2007, the percentage of those who have provided a positive, failed or refused breath test has almost trebled. Intelligence led targeted policing of the regions roads uses assets more efficiently with the aim of making the roads safer for everyone.

As a driver I'm being victimised - FALSE.

The victims of drink driving are those who are killed or seriously injured by drink drivers. The consequences of driving while impaired through drink or drugs can be devastating – a car in the hands of someone in that condition is a collision waiting to happen – reaction times go up and spatial awareness reduces. Despite long term reductions, drink and drug driving still accounts for 15% of road deaths and almost 10,000 casualties nationally each year. Think about the consequences, the devastation caused to families affected and how many lives are needlessly lost when otherwise law abiding people decide to commit a crime thinking they won't get caught.

In our policing area, you are twice as likely to get caught.

District Councillor David Hurley

As I write, the wind is blowing fairly fiercely outside but I'm still counting my blessings that the tail end of Hurricane Ophelia decided to leave Devon mostly unscathed. What I find amazing is the fact that it is exactly 30 years to the day since the devastating storm of 1987. Driving into TDC today I noticed that the temperature was for October an unseasonal 16C, and, arriving at Riverbank House I observed how rough and choppy the River Torridge was.

Talking of Riverbank House brings me to the topic of the TDC Transformation programme. The new building addition to the Council's base is nearly complete and staff should be occupying the accommodation just prior to Christmas. You may have noticed that Bridge Buildings, (where staff will be moving from), which are situated next to the Town Hall and west of the old bridge in Bideford, has been placed on the market for sale or lease. There have been several viewings to date and it will be interesting to see who eventually occupies this Grade 2 listed building, that was built in the 18th Century, and to what use it is put.

On to local matters and the building project at Langtree Meadows. I was pleased when I heard that your Parish Council Chairman, Terry Attridge, together with Sue Lee and Geoff Bond met with the builder Brian Clayton and three directors of the Company he represents to try and get some action on the many problems presently existing on this site. The outcome was that promises were made by the directors to fix some long standing issues and agreement was reached that the playing field will at long last have drainage installed. I remember having my photo taken to use in my election leaflet with the houses at Langtree Meadow in the background, after I had helped the previous builder to negotiate a path through the planning procedure. The inference was that they would soon be finished and occupied. But wait, that was over 2 and a half years ago and to date only one more house has been occupied. At this rate I'll be long gone before the whole site is complete.

One good thing that hopefully will come of this is that the window that has to date never been fitted in the new pavilion will be. This will enable the committee to authorise the fitting out of said building and start to spend the £16,500 that TDC contributed, and I supported, from the New Homes Bonus. Once this building is complete and the drainage installed under the playing surface it will be possible to pursue an idea I floated at a Parish Council meeting some time ago. That is a floodlight for the Air Ambulance to allow them to land in Langtree at night. I'm happy to say that Shebbear's floodlight went live at the beginning of October and it would be great if Langtree could emulate this achievement in the near future.

Final plans for the repair of the end of life expansion joints on the Torridge Bridge have been announced. This bridge is now 30 years old and there is no option but to replace the expansion joints. It has been announced that repairs will take place overnight commencing on 2nd January 2018. Work is expected to take 12 weeks. Vehicles wishing to cross the bridge will be controlled by traffic lights from 1900-0700. Outside of these hours a temporary plate will cover the works area to allow movement of vehicles in both directions across the bridge. I'm told that the new joints, albeit with the benefit of 30 years experience, are around 80% quieter which should please the residents who live within the shadow of the bridge.

Still on the subject of roads, but closer to home, the thorny matter of parking in Fore Street Langtree was raised at the October meeting of the Parish Council. Melissa Baker, who is the PCSO for this area stated that the police can do very little about this as no actual offence is being committed. It just makes negotiating the narrow roads just that little bit more difficult. It has been suggested in the past that further parking spaces are provided in the Crescent just in front of the allotments/community garden. Even if new spaces were provided, would those that presently park on the road actually use them and alleviate the present problem?

I mentioned earlier about the New Homes Bonus. This is the second year of this scheme and to date £750,000 has been granted to a number of schemes. These include village halls, sea cadets, money towards a mini-bus, a car park at Dolton Village Hall and of course the money for the pavilion here in Langtree.

The scheme will continue next year although the money available is likely to be less than this year due to a cut in funding from the Government.

<u>Langtree Parish Council – Terry Attridge, Chairman</u>

Good news. Just as the last news letter went to press the LPC was asked to accept transference of the Land to the rear of the Parish Hall. The developers of the site have not yet discharged all their commitments under the S106 which governs the development of the entire project. We consulted the Torridge District Council (TDC) solicitor and were assured that any litigation which resulted from this situation would be borne by TDC. In consequence the transfer document was signed and LPC are now the proud owners of approximately 6 acres to the rear of the Parish Hall.

The LPC will remain the owners of the field, as indeed we do the Parish Hall, but the day to day running of the facility will be under the auspices of the Parish Hall Committee (PHC). The details of this arrangement will have to be worked out. It may be that LPC will be responsible for the grass cutting in this area but we envisage a situation where whatever users appear, football teams, cricket clubs, netball teams etc will contribute to the financial viability of their facilities.

Those of you who have peered through the gap in the hedge will realise this land is a great opportunity for Langtree. About one acre has been levelled and in most people's eyes this would be destined to be a recreational field to include a football pitch, but nothing is set in stone.

To make a success of this project it has been suggested that a meeting should be held between the LPC and the PHC (Parish Hall Committee) so that everyone knows what finances are available and what may be applied for. Shortly after there will be an open meeting for parishioners and interested parties. This has been arranged for 25th November from 2pm onwards.

This would not be a formal meeting but representatives of the LPC and the PHC would be available to answer questions. Some of you may remember that we held a similar meeting when the Hall first opened. People were able to sign up and show an interest in various activities. I'm sure ideas will pour in, some will be immediately fundable and others will require longer term fund raising, but look at the Parish Hall, all things are possible. Here are a few ideas of mine.

A skate boarding area, an all weather playing surface, five aside football pitch, a boule pitch, women's football team, walking football for over fifties, netball court, an interesting dog walking area, a tennis court. The space itself could allow the resurrection of the collective sale we used to have, fun days, car boot sales, sports days, barbeques, whatever.

Finally, don't be limited by other people's horizons. The Parish Hall had more than enough detractors. I remember one person saying 'We'll never have a village Hall in this village, and if we do we won't be able to afford to run it, and nobody would use it. Well it didn't work out like that and if there is a genuine demand for this facility it will be a success too.

I am writing this on the day the Cassini space mission comes to an end. It has challenged our thinking about the solar system; it has witnessed the birth process of a moon; it has sent back reams of data that will keep scientists at work for years to come. It has been a phenomenal success.
