Community Friendship Meetings

When a group of us 'slept out' (in Shebbear church) early in December last year we were raising funds not only for The Big Sleep Out (an international charity) but for The Harbour Project, in Bideford. I have come across a couple of people who use Harbour and have visited it myself. I am hugely impressed with the way they support homeless and vulnerable folk in Bideford. For one man I met, this place was clearly a haven, a refuge for him where he goes regularly, for friendship, warmth and acceptance.

As I understand it, Harbour relies entirely on charitable donations. There is no state funding. Harbour is open 4 days a week, and one of the services they provide is a hot meal.

During the sleep out I met Lorna, who volunteers there. She is one of the cooks. Talking to her it seems as if Harbour relies on donations of food, and some fresh food bought by the volunteers themselves. Most of the donations are, necessarily, I suppose, tinned.

However, we ALL need, and deserve good food. Fresh food is good food. It struck me, as a gardener, that locally, many of us grow fruit and vegetables, and many of us grow more than we need and can use. And there are always those 'gluts' when we can't give away enough, because our neighbours have had the same glut!

Would it be possible to set up a collection system in the nearby villages whereby we could collect any surplus and pass it on to Harbour ?

It shouldn't be difficult and beyond our wit, to organise this, surely? To provide for our 'neighbours' and to reduce food miles

District Councillor David Hurley

Hello again. I hope that you had a pleasant Christmas and New Year and that 2020 brings you all that you wish for.

Let me start by saying how pleased I am that at long last the affordable houses (well most of them) at Langtree Meadows have now been occupied. This saga went on for far too long and, as I've said before, the people that suffered the most were those that wanted to buy the properties. Now that they are in and making the houses their homes I wish them every happiness for the future.

Last year ended with a General Election and I think there was a collective sigh of relief when a majority Government was elected which would allow Parliament to function as it should, dealing with important issues, both long standing and immediate. Many of these issues have been held in abeyance for too long I believe. With a working majority decisions can be taken with, hopefully, little or no hold ups in the proceedings. I hope in the Governments rush to thank the voters in the North, by way of financial inducements and new projects, they don't forget that the South West is in need of assistance also.

With all the rain that has fallen over the past few months problems with our local roads have reappeared. The pothole problem and general deterioration of our roads is not restricted to our area but is Devon wide and as such the money available to repair them is not sufficient. I have reported several potholes but as ever it's a case of waiting for action to take place. Please report problems to Devon County Council, be it a pothole, flooding, street lights or one of many other categories, go to their webpage https://www.devon.gov.uk/roadsandtransport/report-a-problem/ and do so there.

Towards the end of November all TDC Councillors received notification from Councillor Anna Dart that she was standing down as Leader of TDC, a position she had held since being elected in May. She cited a number of reasons for this decision and felt it was better for all concerned if she took this action. Subsequently at the next Full Council meeting that was held in December the Deputy Leader Cllr Ken James was elected Leader, and Cllr Claire Hodson was elected Deputy Leader.

Once again at this time of year all Councils start to consider their budgets for the forthcoming months. When you read this your Parish Council will have already decided what the increase to their precept will be. The decision to be taken at Torridge this year will be interesting as there are so many new councillors with many differing opinions.

We have had considerable works done over the Christmas holiday period. The car park has had several tons of gravel spread, the Hall floor has been sanded and revarnished and new carpet has been fitted in the foyer and Leader room.

We have raised over £3500 from the Christmas Lunch and Auction and this will be put towards funding for the MUGA (multi use games area). Thank you to all who donated puddings for the meal and gifts and promises for the auction. One auction lot proved to be a bit of a bargain! 2 bottles of French red wine vintage 1994 were donated and originally came as a gift from North Devon Meat. The two bottles sold at auction for £12 but when the buyer checked the label on the Internet was shocked to learn that it was possible to buy one bottle for£364! The bottles had been stored in a barn so the condition of the wine was not known but I understand that it has now been drunk but not worth £364!

Funds raised this year will be used towards the installation of a ground source heat pump. 1800 m of trenching has to be made in the dog walking area for pipes to be laid. The bar will also be open most Fridays when the hall is not booked for an event. See the hall notice board for details.

Many of us will have flown with Flybe, especially with it being based at Exeter. We may even know people who work for the company, and so will have felt the pain of the recent threat to the airline. But it does seem somewhat strange that just at the moment when a company is being confronted with people flying less - as all indications of climate crisis suggest we must learn to do - the government, on our behalf, steps in to reduce costs, and so presumably encourage more people to fly again. Just what are we thinking of? I have every sympathy with people telling me – normally with great delight – how they have got a bargain price for a flight to Glasgow, or Norwich, or wherever. It seems a no-brainer, when train travel is so expensive and often crowded. But so often those bargains cover up the true costs involved. And too it's those regional flights that are so damaging environmentally with huge amounts of fuel burned in the going up and the coming down.

We have to start thinking differently. So here's a chance – Lent is approaching. Traditionally a time to rethink our habits and examine our ways. Climate crisis demands of us not just a few adjustments here and there, a tweaking every now and then. That simply will not do. Indeed every change so far seems to have made matters worse. 'Oh, car engines are more efficient, so I burn less petrol per mile ... that means I can go further!' Result: just as much CO2 produced.

Actually we need a whole new attitude, a whole new way of life – what Jesus called a change of heart. It's a way that values people before property, the world before wealth, relationships before luxury. It might all feel too big a change – 'I'm too old', 'Life is too hard', 'I'm far too busy' – and probably it is on our own. We need each other. And God promises us his help too, if we ask. Maybe we can make a difference. Use Lent this year to have a go. And that has to include flying less for those of us that do.



Langtree Parish Council

It has been a reasonably quiet couple of months for the Parish Council mainly dealing with business as usual activities.

We were unfortunately unsuccessful on a couple of grant applications for the Multi Use Games Area in Langtree and to upgrade the play area in Beech Road, Stibb Cross. Over the next few weeks we will make further applications for funding and hope these will be successful.

The football pitch is available and we are looking to set up a group responsible for the active use and management of the pitch and area. It is likely that the set up will be a stand-alone arrangement separate from the Parish Hall and Parish Council although having close links to them both. If you are interested in being involved with setting this up then please let me or any of the Parish Councillors know.

60 trees have been donated by the Woodland Trust to the Parish Council and it is intended to plant these in the dog walking area behind the Parish Hall. The trees will be delivered in early March and it is intended to plant these out by the end of the month. We will advertise when this will happen and will request volunteers.

Potholes – these are not the responsibility of the Parish Council but of Devon County Council. They have a very good website where holes and many other highways issues can be reported at https://www.devon.gov.uk/roadsandtransport/report-a-problem/

And finally - Langtree Parish Council has a small amount of money that it can award to groups in the parish who bring a benefit to the community.

The type of activity that these funds can be used for include:

- the project should be something which makes the local community a better place in which to live, work or visit;
- it should benefit people who live in the parish;
- there must be clear evidence that local people support the project and are involved in carrying it out;
- each group may only make one application per financial year

Langtree News Article – DCC Cllr Andrew Saywell – for Winter 2020

I would like to start my first article in 2020 by wishing all readers of Langtree Parish Magazine a prosperous and successful year ahead. As we go into the new decade, I believe it will be one of increased opportunities for local government as the new Government is likely to press ahead with the 'devolution agenda'. How that will pan out in Devon remains to be seen but I would not be at all surprised if by the end of the decade our current system of Parish, District and County Councils will look very different to what we have now.

But for the time being, the day to day work of our Councils continue. Here in Langtree, I know the issue of speeding through the Parish is a concern for a lot of residents. Back in the autumn of last year, following on from a discussion at the Parish Council I asked Highways if they could do a speed survey of traffic through the both Langtree and Stibb Cross.

This was duly done. At the time of writing this article I am still waiting for the figures for Stibb Cross however the statistics for Langtree are as follows:

Westbound traffic, mean speed of 27 mph. Eastbound traffic, mean speed of 27.3 mph.

The average flow of westbound traffic was 582 vehicles in one day and eastbound traffic was 550 vehicles.

These surveys are essentially anonymous as motorists are recorded using traffic counters or unmarked vehicles and not with a police car – so motorists should not be slowing down artificially because they have suddenly spotted a police vehicle! I think it is reassuring that the results came through below the speed limit but nevertheless just because the average speed was below the limit, it does not mean all the vehicles were driving below the limit. I will keep a watching brief on this and if there are any further developments I will let readers know.

On more pan-Devon matters, the start of the year has seen the approval by the Fire Authority of revised changes to the Devon and Somerset Fire and Rescue Service compared with the consultation which was published last summer. I am a member of the Fire Authority and I was pleased the revised set of proposals did not see large scale station closures and instead approved a new payment system for on call or 'retained' firefighters, alongside more flexible crewing arrangements and a new duty system for fulltime firefighters which will free up personnel to crew new 'roving' appliances. These crews will carry out home safety visits and community safety and prevention work throughout Devon and Somerset.

A lot of the media coverage about the Fire Service concentrated on 'cuts' however the proposals were never about making cuts to save money but to reform the service. Working practices in the fire service fundamentally have not changed significantly since the 1970s and many of our on-call fire stations were struggling with crew shortages and being able to keep their fire engines available during the working day.

While some stations may need to be relocated in time due to population growth and new infrastructure there is and will not be any threat of closure to our nearest local stations in Torrington, Bideford, Holsworthy and Hatherleigh. While Appledore was originally earmarked for closure, its coverage area does fall under Bideford and the new crewing and payment arrangements approved by the Fire Authority should help to improve the availability of the fire engine at Appledore.

If you have any questions or comments about the Fire Service changes, I would be very happy to hear from you. Equally, if there are any pressing County Council matters you need any help with please don't hesitate to contact me.

Have you moved into Langtree Parish in the past year or two? I hope you have settled in well and are finding this a happy place to live. Hopefully you have discovered some of the many groups & activities listed on the back of this magazine & have made many new friends. Are you aware there is a Local History Group which meets on 4th Wednesday of each month except August & December. We meet in the leader room of the Parish Hall at 7.00 & anyone is welcome. We pay £1.00 per person each evening to cover the cost of hiring the room.


menced its winter session on stonday evening last, twelve members being enrolled.

Community Advice...

Due to my parents recently receiving a barage of these calls (3 in the space of an hour) I wanted to highlight one of the latest forms of telephone scam happening at the moment, which hopefully could help others alleviate worry should you receive such a call...

Beware the new scam where fraudsters call to say there is an arrest warrant in your name - from a genuine HMRC number

Fraudsters are phoning victims to say an arrest warrant has been made in their name because of unpaid taxes or outstanding debts. But even more sinister, the fraudsters are cloning phone numbers used by HM Revenue and Customs so that it appears as if the phone calls are coming from the trusted authority.

The automated message asks people to press a button on their phones to speak to someone, warning that if they don't they could face serious legal consequences.

HM REVENUE & CUSTOMS

The number is usually displayed on a person's phone as 0300 2003300 – the official number of HMRC. On some phones, when the call comes through HMRC appears on their screen as if that is the genuine caller.

However, while the number appears to be a genuine it is in fact from fraudsters looking to trick unsuspecting victims out of their money.

An HMRC spokesperson says: "HMRC takes security extremely seriously. We are aware that some people have received telephone calls from individuals claiming to be from HMRC. We have a well-known brand, which criminals abuse to add credibility to their scams.

"These scams often involve people receiving a call out of the blue and being told that HMRC is investigating them. If you can't verify the identity of the caller, we recommend that you do not speak to them."

Known as spoofing, there has been a surge in this type of scam in recent years.

As well as cold calling, fraudsters also leave voicemails and use text messages asking victims to call back on the number provided.

When victims call back, they are told that there is a case being built against them for an outstanding debt and they must pay immediately.

Fraudsters will often ask for payment in iTunes gift card voucher codes as they can be easily redeemed and sold on. The scammers don't need the physical card to redeem the value and instead get victims to read out the serial code on the back over the phone.

A spokesperson for Action Fraud says: "This type of contact is designed to convince you to hand over valuable personal details or your money.

"Don't assume anyone who has contacted you is who they say they are. If an email, phone call or text message asks you to make a payment, log in to an online account or offers you a deal, be cautious and report it to Action Fraud."

What you can do to guard against the fraudsters

- 1) Recognise the signs genuine organisations, such as banks and HMRC, will never contact you out of the blue to ask for your PIN, password or bank details
- 2) Stay safe do not give out private information, reply to text messages, download attachments or click on links in emails you weren't expecting
- 3) Take action forward suspicious emails claiming to be from HMRC to phishing@hmrc.gsi.gov.uk and texts to 60599, or contact Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 to report any suspicious calls or use its online fraud reporting tool
- 4) Check Gov.uk for information on how to avoid and report scams and recognise genuine HMRC contact
